DO YOU APPRECIATE YOUR LIFE IN TODAY'S WORLD?

If you are a nonagenarian or an octogenarian or even a septuagenarian do you ever reflect on how your life was as a child or teenager? Likely there were minimal conveniences then. Those days seem somewhat primitive compare to 2018. Not everyone had a car (or two) and walking was an expected mode of transportation. Some may recall that a car needed to be started by cranking it. There was no automatic shifting. You had to coordinate the clutch and the gas pedal – a real challenge on a hill. Today, if you have a sports car with a gear shift, it is a choice, not the only thing available.

Think about your household appliances compared to then and now. There were no automatic dishwashers so mom (and the kids, after much nagging) washed and dried dishes by hand. You may recall cook stoves fueled by oil, gas or coal or wood. Temperature regulation was a challenge for cooking and baking. There were no electric crockpots with automatic timers. (But there were pressure cookers). Bless the cook who could coordinate having all parts of the meal done at the same time.

When mom did the laundry she may have had to heat the water on that cookstove. Her washer probably needed manual skills to rub-a-dub-dub the clothing and linens. Drying necessitated hanging the wash on a clothes line and praying for a sunny

day. And there were no electric irons, so the iron had to be heated on the cookstove.

Oh the joy of the modern bathroom!!! Being able to use indoor facilities is taken for granted these days. Being able to have a warm shower or bath is considered an ordinary experience now, unlike the days of using a basin and a wash cloth to take a bath.

What did you do for entertainment? There was no TV and very few movie theaters in those early days. At some point you may have had a battery powered radio and could hear Lowell Thomas give the news. Your dad may have rationed the amount of time you could listen to music or other programs. Family and friends played cards, used board games (like Monopoly), played musical instruments, or did outdoor activities like jump rope, baseball, tennis or badminton.

As you reflect back, you may recall that those days may have been less stressful, more relaxed and possibly even happier. The younger elders among us may have never experienced some of the circumstances described here so may be at a different level of appreciation. The older elders can smile and say we lived through it all, but we surely do like using an electric blanket and watching our favorite TV shows. (Contributed by Jane Burger)

Born and bread in Minnesota, Doughboy rose quickly in show business, but his later life was filled with turnovers. He was not considered a very smart cookie, wasting much of his dough on half-baked schemes.

If you smiled while reading this, please rise to the occasion and pass it on to someone having a crumby day and kneading a lift.


