DID YOU KNOW . . .

10 SURPRISING GOOD USES FOR SALT

1. Deter ants

Sprinkle salt in doorways, on window sills and anywhere else ants use to sneak into your house. It's a sure way to keep them out!

2. Kill grass and weeds growing in cracks in your driveway

Tired of weeding your driveway? Sprinkle salt on the grass and pour very hot water over it. Not only is this a highly effective way to kill unwanted plants, it's also eco-friendly and cheap.

3. Say goodbye to fleas

If your dogs have fleas, simply wash their doghouse and blankets in salt water. If you're worried your dogs may have brought fleas into your house, simply sprinkle your carpets lightly with salt and then brush it in. Leave it for 12 hours and vacuum thoroughly.

4. Pick up a dropped egg

If you drop an egg on the kitchen floor, sprinkle salt on the mess and leave it there for 20 minutes. You'll be able to wipe it right up.

5. Clean up oven spills quickly

If a pie or casserole bubbles over in the oven, pour a handful of salt on top of the spill. It won't smoke, smell and, most importantly, will bake into a crust that makes the mess easier to clean once it's cooled.

6. Clean brown spots off your iron

Simply sprinkle salt on a sheet of waxed paper, slide the iron across it and rub lightly with silver polish. Your iron will look like brand-new in no time.

7. Remove stains from your coffee pot

Fill it with 1/4 cup of table salt and a dozen ice cubes. Swish the mixture around, let it sit for half an hour, fill it with cold water and rinse. Your coffee pot will look brand new.

8. Keep your windshield frost-free

Dip a sponge into salt water and rub it on windows, and they won't frost up even when the mercury drops below zero.

9. Shell nuts more easily

Soak pecans and walnuts in salt water for a few hours before shelling them. Doing so will make it easier to remove the meat.

10. Drip-proof candles

If you soak new candles in a strong salt solution for a few hours, then dry them well, they won't drip when you burn them.

She will be serving her year in a town in Southern Austria in the state of Carinthia called Spittal an der Drau. It is a picturesque town close to the Italian border nestled in the Austrian Alps.

The Fulbright Foreign Language Teaching Assistantship program in Austria is a program offered to recent university graduates interested in working as teaching assistants in secondary schools in Austria. U.S. Teaching Assistants are assigned to one or two secondary schools in Austria that need help teaching students English. Those accepted into this program must be able to adapt to and embrace new cultures. Teaching Assistants help teachers of English for 13 hours a week. The program, overall, is a great way to gain a better command of both German and English.

A senior at the University of Colorado's College of Arts and Sciences, Marni pursued a double major in International Relations & German. Marni made the Dean's List which required that a student hold a 3.75 or better GPA and be enrolled in at least 12 graded credit hours of coursework for the given semester. This achievement ranks Marni among the top students at the University.

Marni has been the recipient of the University of Colorado's Alumni Association Award for her leadership, engagement and service to the

University community. Marni also served as two-term President of the University's Student Alumni Association and as Vice President of the University's Model United Nations chapter among her many awards.

Marni is a 2007 graduate of the Shipley School in Bryn Mawr. Prior to graduating from the Shipley School, Marni attended the American International School-Vienna in Vienna, Austria and Caley Elementary School in King of Prussia.

THE HISTORY OF FATHERS' DAY

Father's Day is a celebration of fathers inaugurated in the early twentieth century to complement Mother's Day in celebrating fatherhood and male parenting. One early observance of a Father's Day took place in Fairmont, West Virginia on July 5, 1908. It was organized by Mrs. Grace Golden Clayton, who wanted to celebrate the lives of the 210 fathers who had been lost in the Monongah Mining disaster several months earlier in Monongah, West Virginia, on December 6, 1907. It is possible that Clayton was influenced by the first celebration of Mother's Day that same year, just a few miles away. Clayton chose the Sunday nearest to the birthday of her recently deceased father.

Unfortunately, the day was overshadowed by other events in the city, West Virginia did not officially register the holiday, and it was not celebrated again. Clayton's celebration was forgotten until 1972, when one of the attendants to the celebration saw Nixon's proclamation of Father's Day, and worked to recover its

legacy. The celebration is now held every year in the Central United Methodist Church.

Credit for what we now recognize as the official Father's Day goes to Sonora Smart Dodd, born in Arkansas from Spokane, who invented her own celebration of Father's Day in 1910. Its first celebration was in Spokane, Washington on June 19, 1910. Her father, the Civil War veteran William Jackson Smart, was a single parent who reared his six children in Spokane, Washington. Although she initially suggested June 5, her father's birthday, she did not provide the organizers with enough time to make arrangements, and the celebration was deferred to the third Sunday of June.

A bill to accord national recognition of the holiday was introduced in Congress in 1913. In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson went to Spokane to speak in a Father's Day celebration and wanted to make it official, but Congress resisted, fearing that it would become commercialized. US President Calvin Coolidge recommended in 1924 that the day be observed by the nation, but stopped short of issuing a national proclamation. Two earlier attempts to formally recognize the holiday had been defeated by Congress. In 1957, Maine Senator Margaret Chase Smith wrote a proposal accusing Congress of ignoring fathers for 40 years while honoring mothers, thus "[singling] out just one of our two parents". In 1966, President Lyndon B. Johnson issued the first presidential proclamation honoring fathers, designating the third Sunday in June as Father's Day. Six years later, the day was made a permanent national holiday when President Richard Nixon signed it into law in 1972. In addition to Father's Day, International Men's Day is celebrated in many countries on November 19 for men and boys who are fathers.

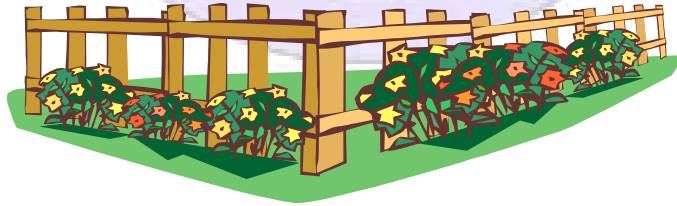
