LEGENDS of LEO

BEST CHRISTMAS TIMES REMEMBERED

Those of you who grew up during the "Great Depression" may relate to some of my personal remembrances of Christmas times I enjoyed the most. One that stands out in my mind was in 1943. My Uncle Bill had been stationed in Europe until after V-E day. He was a special uncle as was his wife, Marjorie (Madge), as we called her. Unbeknown to us six kids, my Aunt had received word that my Uncle would be arriving at Fort Dix, N.J. a day or two before Christmas. Somehow everyone was able to keep this great secret from us. In fact he walked in our front door as we were putting the final touches on the Christmas tree. Bedlam broke loose as we all rushed to hug him and say "Welcome home, and Merry Christmas!"

It is hard to concentrate about Christmas. As I write this on Election Day and it is 65 degrees outside and very sunny. In fact I know I should be out raking leaves to the curb for the township pickup next week. As they say today, "It is what it is" (so you might as well live with it!)

We young boys were far from angels. I recall making frequent trips to Strawbridges in Ardmore after school. We were young enough to line up to sit in Santa's lap, convey our wish list and get rewarded with a lollypop. We would then scoot to the back of the line and go thru the routine again (changing our wish list, of course) and nab another lollypop. This was working pretty well until one of our gang's dad got a job playing Santa Clause...the jig was up but it was fun while it lasted!

We were virtual angels reporting to church to serve as altar boys for the 5:30 a.m. Mass. I recall taking a short cut across a neighbor's back yard on the way to church, walking across encrusted snow that did not break under my footsteps. At one of those early morning Christmas masses, I was fasting prior to receiving Communion and during the solemn high ceremony suddenly I felt like I was going to faint. I was able to reach the exit where Sister Loretta Loyola, the mentor of the Altar servers, put her arm around me and led me to a bench where she made me get my head down below my knees and I started feeling much better. She made me lie down on the bench and took her heavy shawl and put it over me. Nuns have taken a bum rap about corporal punishment....this was one of many instances where their true humanity offset any of the bad stuff. After Mass, I recovered sufficiently to line up for the traditional silver dollar and box of hard candy from the Pastor, Father Kelly.

At home on Christmas Eve we got to hang a stocking on the banister of the stairway. I found that my sister's long brown uniform stocking held more goodies than any of my socks could hold. Christmas morning the stockings were loaded with walnuts, fruit, chewing gum, a couple of dollar bills, hard clear candy in the shape of animals, a new toothbrush and toothpaste (surely needed after devouring all that great stuff!) I guess today I would be charged with concealing a dangerous weapon but the only thing I really wanted for Christmas was a pair of leather boots that had a little sleeve that held a Boy Scout knife. You know "be prepared" was very important. You never knew when you might have to peel an apple or whittle a branch to skewer a hot dog for a campfire, or be challenged to a game of Mumbly Peg. A real game, look it up.

Before the age of TV, after Christmas dinner, everyone retired to the living room. From the hallway to the living room there was an archway that provided a perfect stage for putting on little skits and plays. All of the kids had to do something: sing a song, tell a joke, etc. We did actually "exit left" and it was only a few steps to the kitchen where we could carve up a few slices of turkey. We aptly named this detour, "The Turkey Trot."

In last month's article, I praised Andy Rooney who could actually make people laugh on his weekly segment of "Sixty Minutes." Andy passed away on November 4th at the age of 92. We have lost a great talent. R.I.P.
